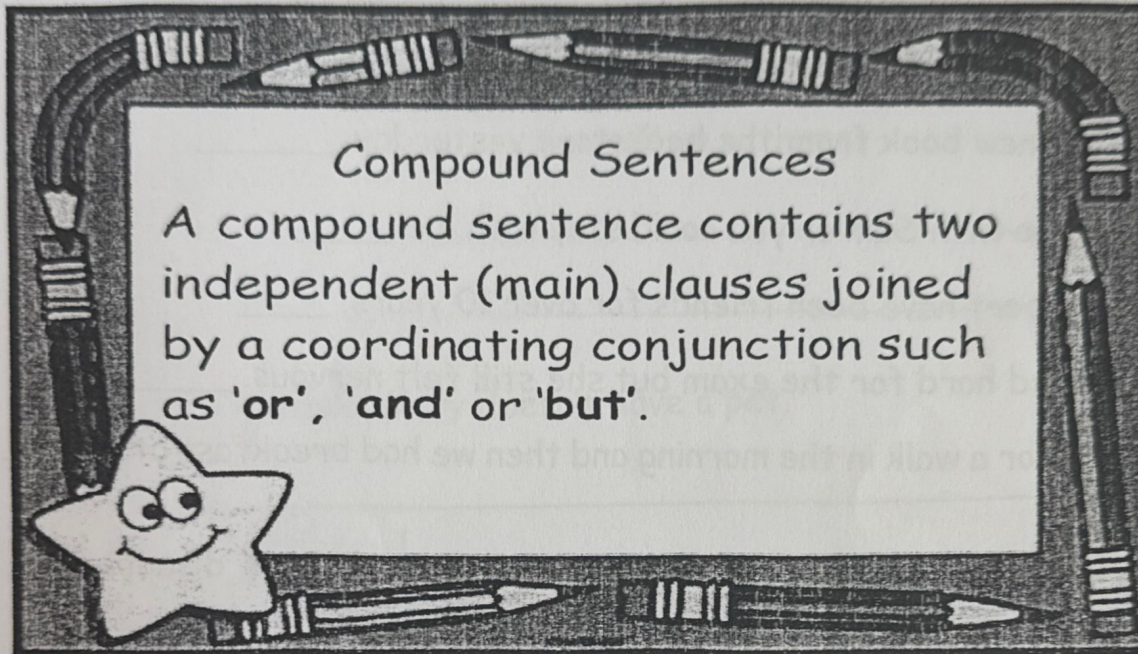


Compound Sentences

independent clause

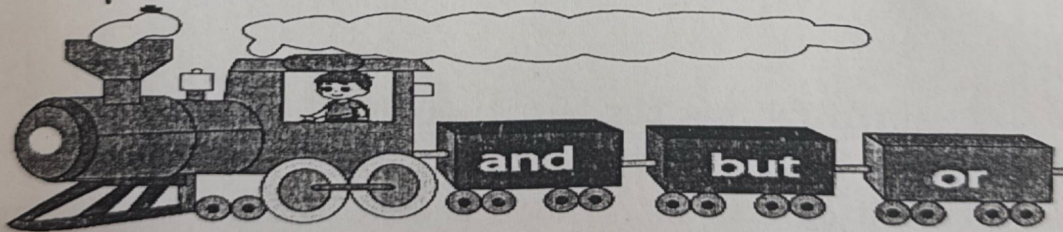
Conjunctions	Uses	Examples
and	to add extra information	My cat went upstairs and it hid behind the toilet.
but	to connect ideas that contrast	I love fruit but I am allergic to strawberries.
or	to introduce an alternative	You could stay at home or you could go for a walk.
