





5 Compare Objects A, B and C.


Then, write the answers.

How do you know?

If we compare Object A with two Object B, Object A will be heavier. Since two Object B is as heavy as Object C, this means Object A is heavier than Object C. If we compare Object C with one Object B, Object C will be heavier. This means Object B is the lightest and Object A is the heaviest.
