➤ Rule# 1:

When a sentence begins with a subordinate clause, it has a comma after it. When the sentence begins with a main clause, there is no comma to separate it from the dependent clause.

- Because the weather was awful, we didn't enjoy the day.

1. Before the bell rang, the teacher collected the books.
2. Although I am not a very good football player, I enjoyed playing football.
3. I will plant more trees while the flowers bloom. (No comma)
4. After Troy ate a giant cookie, he got a stomach ache.

➤ Rule# 2:

Place a comma after introductory words or phrases that tell where, when, why, or how.

- On the way home, I decided to travel to Scotland during the holiday.
- On Christmas, we will visit our grandparents.
- Because of the bad weather, we couldn't play outside.
- With a hammer, he knocked down the wall.
- Wow, your handwriting is amazing!

1. Seriously, did you make this cake from scratch?
2. Throwing the ball, she pulled a muscle in her arm.
3. Yes, I do need that report.
4. Well, I never thought you would clean your room.
5. Hello, my name is Anna.

➤ **Rule# 3:**

Add a comma before and after an appositive. An appositive is a noun or pronoun that renames or identifies another noun or pronoun in some way. An appositive phrase consists of an appositive and its modifiers.

- Lizzy, one of the 10 finalists, won the game.

Use commas to separate words and word groups in a simple series of three or more items.

3. Tommy plays basketball, tennis and football.


➤ **Rule # 5: Refer to [Worksheet 5: Direct Speech](#)**
